#### From our Minister ...

#### MINISTERS' SUMMER SCHOOL 2018



The main speaker was Revd. Robert Pope, a URC minister and church historian, who has been working at University of Wales, Trinity St. David, in Carmarthen and Lampeter, and is about to take up a post at Westminster College, Cambridge. As well as Reformation history, there were also contributions from churches around the National Synod of Wales, giving examples of how the churches are active and adapting to serve in the 21<sup>st</sup> century, under the title, 'It Just Works!' All of this, in the green and tranquil setting of Lindors Country House Hotel in the Forest of Dean!

#### IT JUST WORKS!



We've heard of Messy Church. We heard about 'Messy Vintage Church' – Rosie Buxton, a CRCW (Church Related Community Worker) from Swansea, talked about working in care homes with people living with dementia. Using music, craft, and the opportunity for good company, regular sessions under the name of 'ChitChat' are offered to people. It is important to recognise

that people do not lose their spirituality just because they are living with dementia.

In Penarth, the Women's Guild became the core group opening up the church to people on their own. Revd. Sue Fender told us that there is keep-fit for seniors, food and conversation ('table fellowship'), 'holiday at home' days in the summer, and games. (Children were invited to come along and teach games they enjoyed, eg Jenga blocks, and the adults taught the children Scrabble.) The local police were so impressed that they have offered a trip to the seaside for the people who come to the group.

In Newport, apart from HHI (Health Help International) which our churches support, there is a community lunch and Saturday breakfast for people who are in a vulnerable state. This developed into training being offered in printing and computing. On Sunday evening there is informal 'café style' worship around a long trestle table – which has resulted in new church members from those who attended the meals.

Revd. Stephen Best told us about his work as transitional minister at Bethesda URC, Tongwynlais. The membership is very small, and traditional forms of worship no longer practical, but the church has re-branded itself as 'A cuppa and conversation church'.

At St. David's Uniting Church, Pontypridd, there is still an evening service, but once a month this takes the form of a 'film and chat evening'. Revd. Phil Wall shared his passion for film and how many films – not necessarily religious – are full of theological themes and questions. Stories in whatever shape or form or medium, have always been a part of humanity and a way of reflecting on our lives, and help us to develop empathy with people whose life-experiences are very different from ours.

We also heard from Revds. Phil Wall and Kathryn Price who are part of the steering group for 'Walking the Way', which will replace TLS (Training for Learning and Serving) from next year. Walking the Way will offer resources, programmes, and gatherings to help us in our Christian discipleship in the URC. In 2019, in place of Summer School, ministers from across Wales, Scotland and England will meet to learn more about Walking the Way. Listen out for more ...

#### **OUR REFORMED HERITAGE**



This year is the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary since Luther nailed his '95 theses' to the door of Wittenberg Cathedral. His protest was against the sale of 'indulgences' – a system which had evolved in the church whereby you could buy your way out of purgatory and speed up your admittance into heaven, a sort of 'get out jail card' in Monopoly terms! The system was lucrative for the church, of course.

In the United Reformed Church, we are heirs of the Reformation. However, Reformation was a long and complicated process rather than a one-off event. There had been earlier movements of protest against the misuse of power by the few in the church. In the early middle ages, the Lollards in England called for many of the reforms which would later become marks of the Reformed churches. John Wycliffe translated substantial parts of the New Testament into English.

Martin Luther (1483-1546) emphasised that salvation comes through faith alone. We cannot earn or pay our way to heaven but rely on God's grace. Luther did not intend to leave the Roman Catholic Church but to change it. He also suggests that the priesthood includes all believers.

John Calvin (1509-1564) developed the thinking further and said that scripture alone is the basis of faith rather than the habits and customs which accumulate over the years. Calvin also emphasised the challenging doctrine of 'predestination' – God's

foreknowledge of who would be saved. It was Calvin's followers, however, who hardened this into an exclusivist and almost fatalistic doctrine.

These earlier reformers, such as Luther, Calvin, Zwingli, are often called 'magisterial' because they did not want to separate church from the secular authorities (magistrates) but saw government and church as interlinked. They also maintained a 'high' form of ministry and church order. Radical reformers broke the inter-dependence of church and state. 'Anabaptists' believed that faith must come through personal decision not an infant baptism and they rejected the authority of the state. Church and state must be separate.

The movement of reform continued. In Britain, with the restoration of the monarchy in 1660 under Charles II, there was the 1662 Act of Uniformity, requiring clergy of the Church of England, to use only the Book of Common Prayer. Those who refused and were ejected from their livings, were called 'Dissenters. These dissenters sowed the seeds of the various 'free churches', marked by freedom to worship without political interference and freedom of conscience. Baptists and Congregationalists also drew on the beliefs of the radical reformers in terms of independent, local church governance. You will have noticed that the URC has inherited our principles from all these strands – faith, scripture, the priesthood of all believers, church governed separately from state, good church order.

But a big question about what it means to be reformed is easily forgotten. First of all, we are part of the one catholic (universal) church. The history of the church before the reformation is also our history. The church did not begin in the Reformation (or during the long course of the Reformation.) As the church has drawn together again through the ecumenical movement, our shared history has been acknowledged and valued. And the history being made today is our history. We also sometimes forget that the URC was supposed to be an interim church, a step on the way to full union of the churches in Great Britain.

October 29<sup>th</sup> is 'Reformation Sunday' –and perhaps a good opportunity for us to re-visit these building blocks of our tradition.

## On Saturday 29th July 2017, Pilgrimage from Penrhys to Margam following the Cistercian Way.

The walk in total is just under 21 Miles and takes in some of the most breath taking views across the valleys. It is promising to be a wonderful day if the weather is with us.

Starting at 5:30 am at Penrhys, we hope to finish in Margam Park at 5pm. This is quite a tough walk as you would expect, as the route is not flat, it involves some pretty steep climbs.

Along the way we are planning to have two stops, one after 6 miles and another for lunch at Llangynwyd (Nr Maesteg).

The Cistercians were enormously important in the history of Wales. Their belief in the importance of self-sufficiency and hard work made them great farmers, and they cleared much of the upland farming landscape of Wales.

The Cistercian abbeys gave hospitality to Welsh poets and chroniclers. It was the Cistercians who wrote to the Pope in support of the Welsh kings Llewellyn ap Iorwerth and Llewellyn ap Gruffydd, and who backed Owain Glyndwr in his bid to regain Welsh independence. The Cistercians looked after important pilgrimage shrines like Penrhys. The ruins of their abbeys are among the most beautiful and evocative places in our landscape.

The walk from Llangynwyd is the shortest leg of the route and if 21 miles seems long then we would welcome you to join us for the last leg.

We are collecting for Christian Aid so any donations would be very gratefully received.

#### **New Funding Award**

The Church has received another Community Regeneration Fund Award for £14, 343. This brings the total amount of financial support received from Caerphilly County Borough Council to just over £101,000. The grant will be used to restore the office and the vestibule area on  $\checkmark$ the ground floor. As this amount covers 80% of the projected building and furnishing costs, I have also applied 🗸 to the Welsh Churches Fund for a maximum award of & ◆ £2,000. A reply to the application is awaited. The VAN- 
✓ guard Centre will donate £500.00 towards this project. The church will be responsible for covering the shortfall. This project will be Phase 6 of the church's restoration programme. The contractor will again be Mr. Clive Saunders from Hereford, Gaslec will be involved and John will project manage on behalf of the church. The work must commence within 3 months' time in order to comply. with the regulations of the funding award.
