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From our Minister ...

Pentecost was the Jewish feast when, as we read in the Acts of the Apostles, the Holy Spirit enlivened and inspired the followers of Jesus. They changed, moved on to new ways of living, sharing their wealth and helping the poorest, praying and praising God, and getting a glimpse of how God's kingdom could start in their time and place.

Early Christians met in ordinary homes, or by rivers, or in synagogues. As the church embraced both Jew and Gentile as followers of Jesus, the church and synagogue split and identified themselves as different religions, often with mutual animosity. The young Christian church did need structures to help it function and adopted many aspects of synagogue worship: prayer, scripture, preaching, singing, elders, then later, an altar table where the Eucharist or Holy Communion could be celebrated. Church buildings and their interior layout were heavily influenced by the model of the synagogue.

Over two millennia there have been churches of all kinds and traditions. We know how many rival churches and chapels there were in the Valleys. Many have closed, as a fast moving modern world, (with opportunities to play sport, social media, easy travel, shopping,) has become more attractive than going to church. Churches of all kinds have seen decline, in members, children, Sunday School, weekday activities, and how they impact on society. Old 'hymn sandwich' styles of worship were very passive, apart from the actual singing of the hymns (singing is another activity which few people do now). The ecumenical movement has reminded us that we are not supposed to be isolated individuals but members of Christ's body, and churches have changed and learned from each other, shared music and liturgy and ideas.

What could a new Pentecost mean for us today? Perhaps, if we trusted each other ecumenically, we would have fewer buildings, but better used, and a minister/priest in every community. In a town like Caerphilly, there are so many churches in the town centre. Perhaps it would be better to have a building or a few buildings – in the right places. Church buildings are needed for public worship, weddings, baptisms, funerals. Leadership is important, and a minister or priest is ordained to lead and serve a Christian community, but they are not the heart of church. It is the whole community of believers and seekers who constitute the church.

Can church be different? Messy church, café church, forest church, house church – all these are ways of being a Christian community which are not really new any more. There are other ways of being church, less traditional, more rooted in community. 'Intentional communities' are small groups of people who choose to live together, a bit like a monastic community. A large independent church in Bristol has bought houses in the poorest parts of the city where Christians share their lives with the people who live there, often helping with the problems which beset some of those who suffer exclusion because of unemployment, poor education, loneliness, ill health, financial and cultural poverty. Getting to know people and helping with something as simple as filling out a form, or debt and

budgetary advice can make a real difference. These intentional communities usually involve younger people just because they are more flexible and available, but there is no reason why any Christians of any age could not choose to express their faith by being church in a place where there is no church building. Befriending, listening, praying together, reading and learning together in a community house, all these reflect the traditions of worship passed down the ages. It's just that the 'monastery chapel' might be the living room, and the monks and nuns might include married couples as well as single people.

We don't live in a Christian culture any more – and we might question whether we ever really have? Over the centuries, the rules and exclusiveness of church institutions have often seemed so far from the pattern of Jesus the Christ, who welcomed all. Instead we have wrapped up church in a Sunday bubble, a Sunday box. At Easter God gives us resurrection – new life, new shape – and at Pentecost, the strength and vitality, the wisdom and vision of the Spirit. What will church look like as the years role on? Is it time for a new Pentecost?

An Easter Reflection

We have once more remembered the cruel death of our Lord Jesus Christ and celebrated the glorious news of His resurrection.

In thinking about this special time for Christians I again feel concern for the way in which our secular society, and particularly the media, dismiss this festival as just another break from work.

We live in a multicultural society and it is reasonable that all faiths, religions and cults are tolerated but the whole essence of the development of our society in the past has been based on firm Christian principles.

Are we in the Church in Britain guilty of allowing our natural predisposition to inclusion and tolerance to letting our Faith become an irrelevant, marginalised part of society?

In my estimation it seems that throughout the ages, Christian philosophers and theologians have spent far too much time trying to interpret and explain the meaning of the Gospels and words of Christian writers, rather than accepting the basic tenets that we hope to live by, as learned from the teachings of Christ. As we see in the letters of Paul, even in the early days of the Church, individuals have put their own interpretation on the teachings of Jesus, usually to justify their own behaviour or to satisfy their own human feelings or demands.

During my career I have lived and worked with Muslims, Hindus, Sikhs and Buddhists. I was never afraid to confess my belief in Christ and not to have to justify it to them. They never seemed to question their beliefs and their festivals were sacrosanct. When they needed to pray, they prayed, when they needed to go to the mosque or Temple they went! No apologies, no justification, just 'It's my belief!'

Our culture has now become almost apologetic for our faith. People who go out and evangelise on the streets are treated as thought they have a psychiatric illness. Those who attend church at looked at askance by passers-by.

The recent BBC programme about the pilgrimage to Santiago di Compostela very much showed the differences in attitudes to faith. The celebrities' seemed to be 'looking to find themselves' but seemed immune to any religious feeling arising out of the effort and purpose of the experience. I couldn't believe that three of the men wouldn't even go into the Cathedral after all that effort. Were they afraid of contamination or of 'catching' Christianity? Well done Kate for holding her views despite all her grumbling!

Much of this seemed to be based on a fear that accepting Christianity means you have to take on inconvenient commitments and give something of yourselves rather than of 'finding' something.

In the Easter service from King's College the story of Thomas Didymus was read. We tend to forget about him

and for his need to see tangible evidence of the resurrection. Unfortunately, there are too many, even in the Christian Church, who feel the need for some perceptible proof of the stories of Christ rather than accepting His teachings and our Faith in Him.

With all the confusing theological arguments I hear which try to explain the mysteries of our Bible I regularly return to the Gospel of Matthew 5,6 and 7 to remind myself of what Christ really wants of us in order to enter His Kingdom.


