From our minister ...

The service of *Compline*, or Night Prayer, is the final church service (or office) of the day. When monks and nuns pray at regular intervals during the day, this service completes the day's cycle of prayer.

It is a tranquil, reflective service, a completion of the day. The opening words are:

'The Lord almighty grant us a quiet night and a peaceful end. Amen.'

Other prayers in *Compline* give comfort but also remind us that life is not all about sleeping!

'Preserve us, O Lord, while waking, and guard us while sleeping, that awake we may watch with Christ, and asleep we may rest in peace.'

There is also the night collect which acknowledges the uncertainty of our lives but trusts in the presence of God with us:

> 'Lighten our darkness, Lord, we pray; and in your mercy defend us from all perils and dangers of this night; for the love of your only Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ, Amen'

October brings the end of harvest time, and this still is an important season even if we townies haven't really seen the farmers hard at work gathering in crops and fodder for livestock. We also notice that our days are growing shorter. It shouldn't be but it's always a big surprise to me when I realise that the dawn is getting later and the gloaming of evening settles sooner. I feel Autumn has something in common with the ending of the day, a sense of winding down. Trees are starting to look naked again, grass stops growing, we put aside the freedom of summer and begin to withdraw into heavier clothes as we wrap ourselves around with more layers. In previous ages, ordinary people would have slept more in the winter, because they couldn't afford candles. Some people are adversely affected by the gloomy time of the year, lack of sunshine, and experience 'seasonal affective disorder' or 'SAD' for short. (One method of lifting ourselves out of gloominess and heaviness is to do cold water swimming! Get down to the sea!)

Autumn also brings the days of remembering, especially in November, especially this year which marks the centenary of the Armistice at the end of World War 1.

Of course we don't and can't stop just because it's cold and dark. The seasons turn. And the morning comes again after night. The prayers in the ancient service of *Compline* encourage us to rest, but also to look forward to the life and work which God gives us to enjoy.

The tradition of keeping the regular canonical hours of prayer is still practised by monks and nuns, and by some Christians in their daily lives outside of a monastic setting. How would it be, even if we can't devote fifteen minutes every three hours, to say the monastic prayers, how would be if we did pause through the day, just for a minute or two, to be still, to give to God the people around us, the tasks we are grappling with, the worries or hopes we have in our hearts?

An Elder Writes ... Creationtide

Many of you will know that I am a follower of Daily Devotions. As I am an early riser I look forward to Daily Devotions arriving on my lap top between 05.59 and 06. 04. Recently we did a study on Ephesians, but every passage and reflection was not always 'my cup of tea.'

An e mail from The Revd. Andy Braunston informed me that we would now be looking at Creation. We would look at passages from both the Old Testament and the New regarding Creation.

We started with Genesis Ch 1, v1 when God decided to create His world out of a formless void. We can surely all enjoy reading about this, His wonderful, practical plans. Without these plans where would we be today?

Romans ch1 v18-23 tells us to be in awe of Him. It says by His eternal power and divine nature, although invisible have been understood and seen through His creation.

The Revd. Ruth Watson, who wrote the reflection on this passage tells us that we cannot know everything, but be inspired by all we see and attribute to God. Never mind the bits we cannot explain. I go along with this, always accepting God as Creator of all. I do not mind how he made order out of chaos. Common sense tells me it might have taken longer than a week, but order came out of God's intentions to create a world which includes you and me.

Let us move on to Psalm 33, a beautiful Hymn of Praise.. The last verse says :

'Let all the earth fear the Lord Let all the inhabitants of the world stand in awe of Him For he spoke and it came to be He commanded and it stood firm.' This is an excellent summary I think.

Alas, there had to be a day when I thought the reflection, not the passage, a bit silly. Turn again to Genesis read from ch 1 v26 -28, the passage where God creates man and woman, tells them to be fruitful and multiply and he blessed them.

It seems that the person writing the reflection reckons that the passage has been interpreted in ways that exclude those who live act and think differently to others. God was simply giving good practical advice on looking after the earth, no mention of exclusion then or indeed now.

In the very helpful book Holy Habits, it says...

'Sometimes we name you Creator

We praise you for your creativity for the beauty of the world and of each human being, and for the diversity of each community.'

This is a fitting tribute to God our Creator, if there can be praise enough for Him.

I imagine that most of us give thanks to Creation and the Creator for different things. No surprises then for my appreciation of

Babies, children, and family particularly mine, Dogs, Nature, Seasons

Most of all I give thanks that our Creator God sent His son to offer all of us a new way of living and creating joy and blessings in our lives.

Please spread the word or collect flyers with all the details and make this exhibition as successful as those in previous years.


