

Swim Tayka

From our minister

We have all heard about the plaque of plastic in the seas, and how pollution, when there is a spillage, can kill a river's wildlife and complex ecosystems in hours.

We also know that water can be dangerous.

Swim Tayka is a small and fairly new charity, which works in developing countries, alongside local charities as much as possible. Volunteers teach swimming and stewardship of water, and teach local people how to teach these skills.

The charity helps to teach the ability to swim. In our world, someone drowns every 40 seconds. Most of these fatalities are in poorer developing nations, where despite the proximity of rivers or seas, many people cannot swim. And many of the people who drown are children, as both parents are working, and older children have to look after younger ones, and accidents inevitably happen.

The other work Swim Tayka does is teaching about care and stewardship of water. Water courses, streams, rivers and the sea, are vital for our food and health. So they need to be kept clean of refuse and sewage.

One of the ways Swim Tayka raises money is through sponsored swims. I am hoping to take part in an English Channel relay swim from Dover to Calais in mid-July this year. This involves a team of six, who have to swim for an hour each, in strict rotation, and there is no giving up when it comes to your turn again! (To be successful the team have to complete the swim in order, never touching the support boat, or another person, and no wet suit. The rules of the *Channel Swimmers and Pilots Federation* state that you can wear trunks or swimming costume, a swimming cap and goggles.) Some of the 22 miles, will be swum in the dark.

There are a few hurdles for me yet. To qualify, the *Channel Swimmers and Pilots Federation*, which is the organisation overseeing both solo and relay swims, requires that participants can spend 2 hours in water under 16 degrees centigrade. There is also a medical.

Why? You may ask! I have come to enjoy swimming, but as a child I had a terror of water. I learned to swim as a young teen – my best friend used the old method of pushing me in and making me swim! Later, as a student, travelling round Europe with an 'InterRail' ticket, I found that swimming could be enjoyable as I relaxed in warm Greek seas. Since then, I have swum regularly for exercise in swimming pools and enjoyed going in rivers and seas, even cold seas off the island of Iona. But I have a lot of work to do on my swimming technique!

I am going to cover the costs of the actual taking part in the relay swim myself, so everything donated will go to the charity. I hope to raise £1500 in addition to my own contribution. I will set up a giving page online, and would be very grateful if this is something you feel you can support.

Rob Writes

Last year, I was nominated to be a member of the URC's 'Accreditation Sub Committee'. This nomination was accepted at General Assembly. When I was nominated I was told the remit of this group is 'Maintaining the Roll of Ministers, and accrediting those applying for inclusion after training or coming from other denominations. It is also concerned with numbers and recruitment and it oversees the work of the national Assessment Board, whose convener is an ex-officio member of the committee'. I have since learned it also has responsibility for approving applications for Special Category Ministry posts and subsequently reviewing these posts as the ministry is developed.

The Sub Committee meets 3 times a year, normally at the URC's offices in London and I have so far managed to attend one meeting. As this is my first involvement with National Committees I'm on a bit of a steep learning curve! For example, in addition to attending the meetings, members also undertake visits to discuss and assess first hand proposals for Special Category ministry; they also carry out interviews of ministers from other denominations and overseas who have applied for inclusion on the Roll of Ministers.

The meeting I attended was exceptional in that it was an overnight meeting in Manchester. The reason for this was that we had a joint session with the Church Related Community Workers (CRCW) Programme Sub-Committee, as there is some synergy in the responsibilities of the 2 Sub-Committees, albeit they are dealing with different types of ministry. As their name implies, both meetings are Sub Committees of the Ministries committee. This has a much wider remit that I have yet to work out, though their

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convenor was a member of my committee. As you can imagine, some of the meeting's work was mundane - dotting the i's and crossing the t's of work that had previously been carried out . However, it also struck me how much care and concern went into the work that the group does. It also gave me and insight into some of the things that are happening in the United Reformed Church nationally. For example, we reviewed a number of applications for Special Category Ministry. For those that don't know, the United Reformed Church tries to ensure about 8% of its deployed ministers are engaged in Special Category Ministry. Special Category Ministry posts are broadly of three kinds:

- First, there have been new or priority areas of outreach where pioneering work is required and where it would not be appropriate to expect the Synod to provide a minister from the existing deployment quota.
- Secondly, there are chaplaincies: ministers in Work Place Ministry or in educational institutions, often universities.
- Thirdly, it has been possible to support innovative ministry in unique situations. These have included the West London inter-faith project and an Environmental Chaplain in Scotland. This ministry is One of the good things that arose from attending the meeting

In Wales, for example, Special Category Ministry was used in Llanfair, Penrhys, and also for the Chaplaincy in Cardiff Bay.

One of the other things that arose from the meeting was that I met a number of people whose names I have only seen before. For example, Revd Susan Durbar, who is now minister in Taunton, but has, in the past contributed to the prayer handbook and also contributes to Daily Devotions.

I also met Derek Estill who is currently Moderator of General Assembly. I told him a little about the transformation that has happened at Van Road and also some of the things that are going on in Penrhys. He is keen to visit South Wales during his time as Moderator (he was originally from Swansea), particularly as he is interested in seeing if he can learn anything from what we have done at Van Road to apply to his own church in Blackburn.

In a local church, we often forget the important work that takes, on our behalf, in the wider denomination, both in Synod and at National level, and the myriad of people engaged in this work. Please take time out occasionally to remember them in your prayers, and if you want to find out any more about what I'm doing, please ask.

Facts About Dewi Sant

- He really existed
- He was at the heart of the Welsh church in the 6th century
- He came from an aristocratic family in West Wales
- His mother was a saint, Saint Non
- His teacher was also a saint, St Paulinus
- He founded a large monastery in West Wales
- He was one of the early saints who helped to spread Christianity among the pagan Celtic tribes of Western Britain
- He became Archbishop of Wales, but remained in his community at Menevia (now called St Davids)
- He was active in supressing the Pelagian heresy
- His shrine became a great place of pilgrimage; four visits to the shrine at St David's were considered the equivalent of two to Rome, and one to Jerusalem!

The most famous story about Saint David tells how he was preaching to a huge crowd and the ground is said to have risen up, so that he was standing on a hill and everyone had a better chance of hearing him.

Report to Church Meeting 3 February 2019

In a recent sermon by Lewis we were encouraged to treat all problems as challenges!

We again have a problem which will be a significantchallenge.

The recent Fire Risk Assessment identified a shortfall in both the emergency lighting and the Fire Alarm system.

Not only is the alarm system not compliant with current regulations but it also should be tested weekly and a record of the tests kept. In the unlikely event of a fire, the Fire Officers will ask to see our test log, and the lack of a record of regular testing could cause us legal problems under the Health and Safety Act.

I am currently exploring the cost of installation of a suitable alarm system. By the 10 February I should have quotations from three different, trusted installers of fire alarm systems. The cost is likely to be up to £8000, although we will make every effort to keep this to the minimum.

We are exploring ways of funding this project. We hope to
get grant support, but we may well have to partly
match-fund the amount we get. This could well significantly
reduce our reserves. We possibly may have to have
another fund-raising exercise within the church
membership.

We have already started the installation of the additional emergency lighting, with favourable terms from our contractor. This is needed not only for the event of a fire but also for the possibility of a power outage in the church or surrounding area.

You may have already noticed the appearance of new illuminated fire exit signs. This project is being completed in stages to reduce the impact of the cost.

I am aware of the continued challenge to a small congregation in meeting the maintenance costs of our lovely Listed Building.
