An Elder writes ...

At the autumn Synod meeting, we were advised that the Synod's Mission and Discipleship Board would be focussing on Climate Change during 2020, and local churches were encouraged to check out what it means to become an Eco Church. Our friends at Hope and Market Square in Merthyr Tydfil have already received a bronze award under the Eco Church scheme. Is this something we would wish to consider at Van Rd?

What's involved? I hear you ask.

Details of the Eco Church scheme can be found online at https://ecochurch.arocha.org.uk/how-eco-church-works/ and below is an extract from the website.

Churches complete the unique online Eco Survey about how they are caring for God's earth in different areas of their life and work. The answers a church provides will collect points towards an Eco Church Award – the more your church does, the more points you get!

If your score doesn't gain you an Eco Church Award straight away don't worry – the idea is to complete further actions in order to gain the points necessary for an Award. For example, you can switch to a green energy company or start using Fairtrade tea and coffee supplies to gain Eco Church Award points.

The survey takes you through five key areas of church life:

- Worship and teaching
- Management of church buildings
- Management of church land
- Community and global engagement
- Lifestyle

It takes into account whether your church has buildings or land, and you can save your survey responses at any point and return to update them as your church completes additional actions.

There are three levels of Eco Church Award – Bronze, Silver and Gold. In order to qualify for an Award you must attain the required standard in each of the areas covered by the Eco Survey that apply to your church (some churches do not have buildings or land). You can see when you have gained sufficient points in each Eco Survey category by looking at the coloured lines that appear on screen with the Eco Survey questions..

Once all the categories on your Eco Survey indicate that you have enough points for an Award, you will be asked whether you want to apply for an award. For Bronze and Silver Awards we will require confirmation from your church leader that they have seen and approved the Eco Survey responses provided on behalf of your church. This will be done electronically, within the survey app. Additionally, for Gold Awards we will arrange for an Eco Church Assessor to visit your church to see and hear for themselves of all that you've been doing to care for God's earth across the areas covered by the Eco Survey.

Once your Award is confirmed, you will receive a certificate and (optional) plaque from A Rocha UK to mark your achievement.

That's what it's all about. Perhaps we could consider at church meeting whether we want to explore this scheme further and see how we can respond to the concerns of the world about climate change.

The Future Appointment of Serving Elders

At the last Church Meeting, eldership was discussed and the Elders asked to find a way forward with regards to re-election of Elders and bring a suggested proposal o the next Church Meeting to be discussed.

Looking again at the terms of office we realised that under the current Rules (each elder serving for a maximum of 6 years then at least a year off,) that 2 Elders should have stepped down in 2018 and 2 are due to step down in 2020. We feel that it might be too big a task to elect 4 new Elders this year so propose that just 2 possibly step down this year and 2 next year.

As the membership numbers decline we feel there might not be many names coming forward for nomination, hence we are looking to the possibility of Elders extending their term of office. We are concerned, however, that this should be given careful thought and should not just be an Elder nominating his/herself to carry on, or a quick 'hands up if you wish 'so and so' to continue.' We believe it should still have due process.

So, the eldership propose the following alternative to the way that elders' term of service may be extended.

1. Elders initially serve for a period of 3 years, with the option of automatically extending the period of service for a further 3 years.

After 6 years continuous service, and every 3 years thereafter, if re-elected, a serving elder must offer themselves for re-nomination as part of the normal process of electing elders.

- 3. Nomination forms for Eldership given to every member. If they wish to nominate a current member who is due to step down, they may do so (providing they have got permission from that Elder.)
- 4. As usual, for a name to go on the ballot paper, the person has to have 4 nominations.
- 5. The ballot of members takes place providing there are more nominations than Eldership places available.
