An Elder writes

Whilst I have been in lockdown, I have spent many hours watching the birds in my garden. The colourful goldfinches, robins and bullfinches, the boisterous starlings and the cheeky sparrows. Their constant chirps and tweets have been a source of great pleasure and comfort to me.

There are nearly 300 verses in the Bible that mention birds. However more than one hundred of these merely use the word "fowl" or "bird," leaving us to guess at the species. It is interesting to note that the Old Testament writers knew more about birds, and apparently were more interested in birds than were the New Testament writers. Paul, for instance, refers to birds only twice in all of his epistles.

The favourite bird of ancient Israel seems to have been the dove. The dove was released by Noah to determine how much the flood waters had abated. It was used as a symbol of the Holy Spirit at Jesus' baptism. Those who were impoverished might use a dove in place of a lamb for a sacrificial offering. The eagle with its powerful wings, its fierce talons, its sharp curved beak, and its predatory habits is the opposite of a dove!

***"But those who wait on the Lord shall renew their strength; They shall mount up with wings like eagles, They shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint."* (Isaiah 40:31).**

Sometimes God gave in to the rebellious pleadings of His people. So it was when He gave Israel quails to eat in the wilderness. Even though God apparently planned a

vegetarian diet for Israel, they had lived so long among "eating meat in Egypt" that they were not satisfied with the food provided, even though some of it was heavenly manna especially and miraculously given.

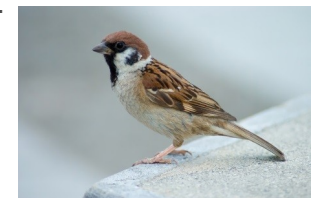
It was the raven that God used to bring food to Elijah. These are voracious, un-clean birds that seem always to be hungry; and yet they kept the prophet alive during a famine while he was hiding from the wrath of Ahab. Unlovely or not, the ravens are under God's care. He provides for them and their young (Job 38:41), and used them miraculously to provide for one of His servants.

Jesus used the sparrow to emphasize one of His most precious lessons—that of His care for each individual. Here the word "sparrow" must surely have meant one of the smaller, colorless birds similar to our race of sparrows, because it apparently had little commercial or sentimental value. "Are not two sparrows sold for a farthing?" (Matt. 10:29). Jesus says ...

"Fear not them which kill the body. . . . The very hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear ye not therefore, you are of more value than many sparrows" (Matt. 10:28-31).

Therefore, in these difficult times it is reassuring to know that the God who notes even a falling sparrow has an even stronger love for each of us. God cares for you and me. So let us put our trust and faith in God, knowing that we are all sheltered under His wings.

**'THANK YOU' for your unique and vital contribution to the life
the United Reformed Church, and for the work of the kingdom
which we are able to do together in God's name**

We are living through an extraordinary and challenging time – a very anxious time for everyone; a difficult time for many; and a time of suffering and loss for some. Yet, the main purpose of this letter is to say **'thank you'** to each of you for all that you have done for the Church in the past; for all that you continue to do even in these difficult times; and for what you will do in the future.

As we are treasurers, you will not be surprised that the focus of this letter is on finance. But we recognise that finance is only a means to the end which is our doing of God's work together.

'Thank you' for your giving to your local church. Financially, this giving is the lifeblood of your own church and of the whole United Reformed Church across England, Scotland and Wales. It is this personal giving that enables your local church treasurer to pay your church's bills. Typically, the largest of those 'bills' is the contribution your local church pays to the URC Ministry and Mission Fund. This Fund meets the central costs of the United Reformed Church. The total budget is around £20 million and is approved each year by Mission Council. Over 80% of this money is spent on ministers and church related community workers – their training, stipends and pensions. But the other 20% also achieves an enormous amount on behalf of us all. General Assembly 2020 was severely constrained because of the Covid-19 lockdown, but the reports written for General Assembly are

available on the URC website, and they paint pictures of all the work that has been done in our name over the last two years and much of that work is ongoing.

'Thank you' for your giving and the giving of your local church last year. In 2019, over **£19.4 million** was given by local churches and synods to the Ministry and Mission Fund. The total contributions from local churches reduced very slightly but the average giving per member has, once again and remarkably, gone up by more than inflation.

'Thank you' for your continued giving this year. We fully understand that circumstances this year are difficult. Most local churches have been unable to meet for over five months. We have not had the usual opportunities to make our offerings for the work of the Church. But most of the costs of the local church and of the denomination have not reduced and some have increased as a consequence of the pandemic. We are also aware that some have lost income or work this year and are therefore in great financial difficulty. But there are others on fixed incomes who are actually better off than they might otherwise have been. **So, please continue to give what you can in whatever way you can – or save it up until you can hand it over.**

Any giving of ours is a response to the amazing generosity and love of God which we see in Jesus. Nevertheless, **it is important for us to say 'thank you' to each and all of you.**

If you have any questions or comments arising from this letter then please speak to your church treasurer, who has been provided with more detailed information. If they are not able to help directly then they can get in touch with the finance team at Church House.

FIRST COMING

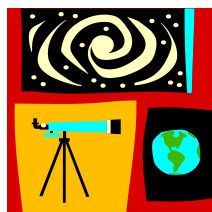
He did not wait till the world was ready,

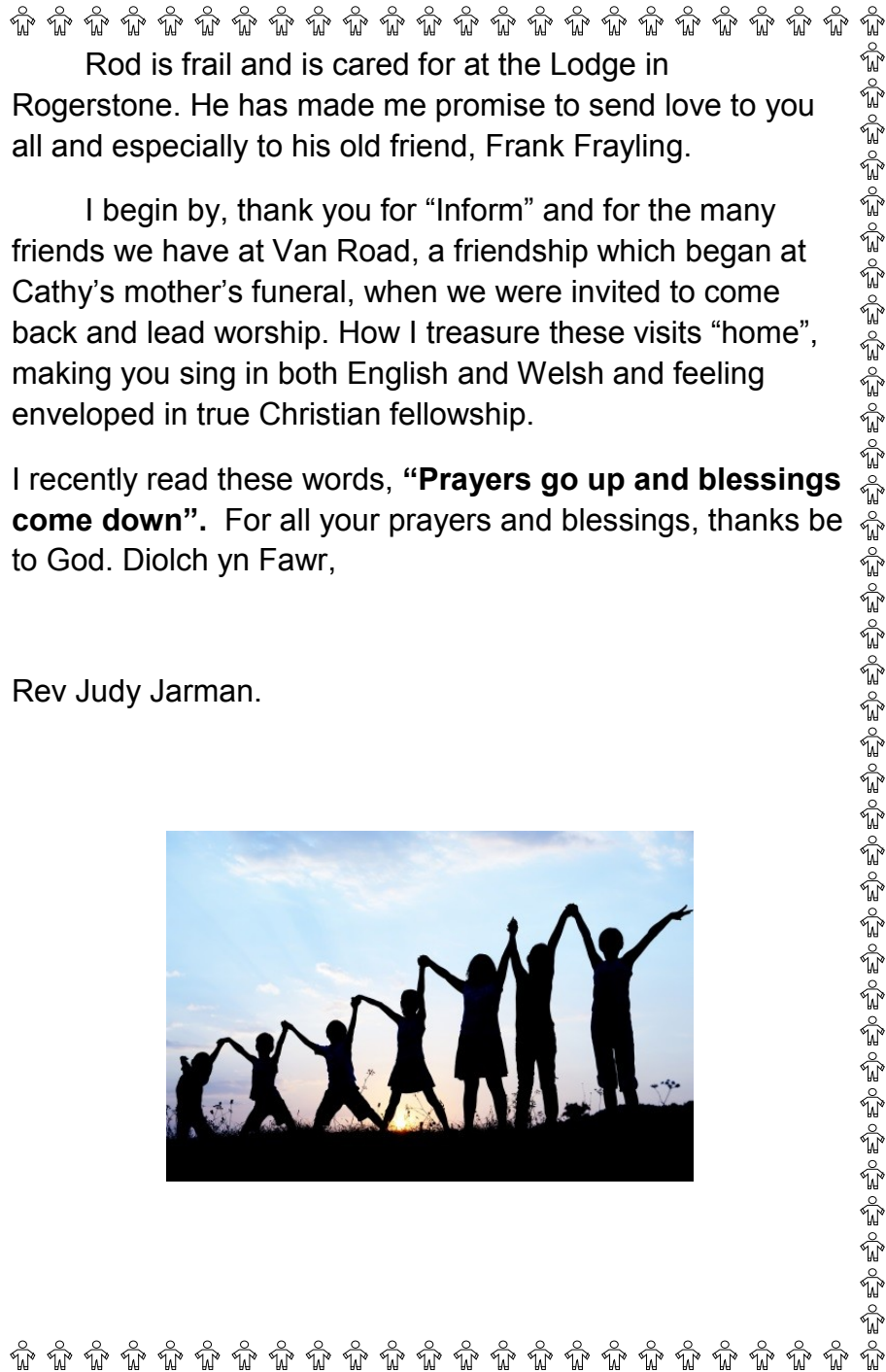
A Friend in Need

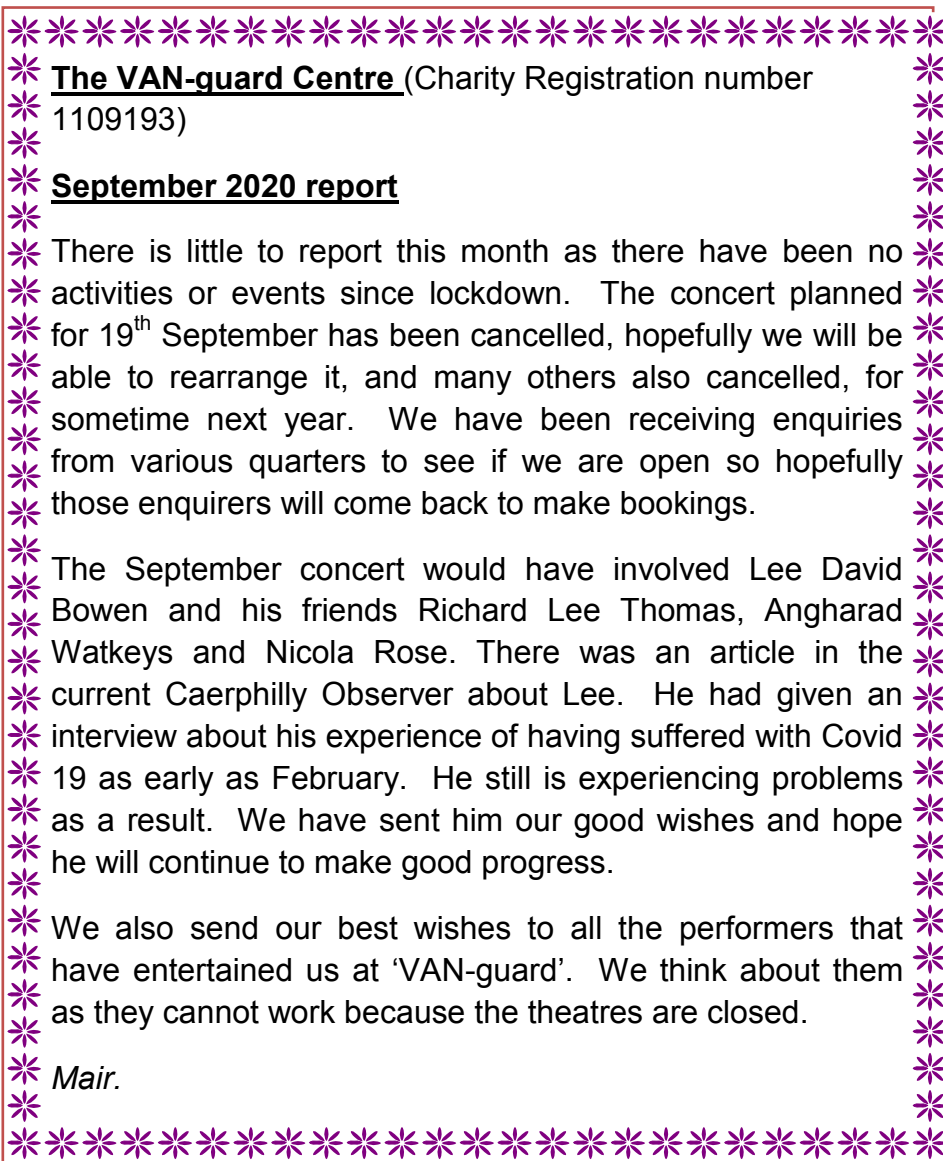


Rod is frail and is cared for at the Lodge in Rogerstone. He has made me promise to send love to you all and especially to his old friend, Frank Frayling.
