



As St Valentine's Day -

falls in February, the month of February is often associated with love. This year any celebrations will be somewhat subdued.

One of the highlights of the Corvid-19 pandemic has been that we have all been able to know our neighbours a little better.

Mark says:-

Love the Lord your God with all your heart and all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' there is no commandment greater than these." Mark 12:30-31

The command to love one's neighbour is found eight times in the Bible. As loving one's neighbour is not always easy, God made the instruction a command.

What does the Bible tell us how to love our neighbour?

Loving our neighbour means showing grace.

Grace helps us to love God. Grace teaches us proper love and respect for ourselves and for our neighbour.

Loving our neighbour means acting with compassion.

When Jesus was asked, "Who is my neighbour?" He responded with a story: the Good Samaritan. Even those who have no love for God see the value of this story. What is the most important aspect of this story? Who did Jesus say was being a neighbour? The one who had compassion.

Loving our neighbour means serving them.

Serving from the heart is kindness in action. Kindness is one of the attributes of love listed in **1 Corinthians 13**. The odd thing

about kindness, though, is we can do acts of kindness without kindness residing in our hearts. If the kind thing is done out of duty, then it isn't love.

Jesus said He came to serve (**Matthew 20:28**). God, who is love, came to serve. Love serves. For us to **love our neighbour as ourselves**, we must have a heart to serve them.

Loving your neighbor means forgiving.

Forgiveness is the very essence of God. Jesus said that forgiveness is then followed by healing.

Forgiveness is freely given to us and to **love our neighbours as ourselves** means we will pass the forgiveness on. Jesus highlighted this in His story in **Matthew 18** when Peter asks how many times should he forgive.

Then Peter came up and said to him, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy times seven."

So the next time your neighbour parks in your car space, makes a loud noise or their children break your favourite flowers with their football, to love your neighbour is to forgive them.

Many aspects of our life have currently been cancelled. However, the love of God is never cancelled, God's love lasts forever.
