He was a Police Constable and dog handler with Gwent Police when aged 32 he was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease. The poem is to be found in his book entitled "**Poems, Parkinson's,** the **Police** and **Me**". It was published in 2014 in order to raise funds for the Parkinson's Disease.

Ø Hywel Griffiths began his career as an Intelligence 6 officer with Gwent Police in 1998 and received two Ø commendations for bravery. The book is endorsed by the Ø then Police and Crime Commissioner for Gwent Mr. Ian Johnson QPM. (In his capacity as P.P.C. Mr. Johnson and his wife attended some VAN-guard events). Hywel's book 6 is also supported by the then Chief Constable for Gwent Ø Ø Jeff Farrar, who described Hywel as an officer with a 0 disability rather than as a disabled officer. 0

He was then Director of Operations for the Welsh Ambulance Service. He had been awarded with the Queen's Ambulance Service Medal in 2016 and holds the Order of St. John. Soon after visiting us he was head hunted to take the position of Chief Operating Officer of St. John's Ambulance which covers the U.K. In the recent New Year Honours List Richard was awarded an MBE for services to healthcare.

Our paths have crossed since that evening at Van Road. He was the guest speaker at the March 2019 Tommy Cooper Birthday Lunch. John and I were at the lunch attended by Richard and his wife. However, even though he was the guest speaker that day, he was last being served lunch, because one of the chefs was taken ill and Richard attended him in the kitchen until an ambulance arrived. Never off duty!

During the pandemic Richard has been volunteering his time
 and paramedic skills on St. John's ambulances treating
 Covid patients.

We are delighted to offer our congratulations to Richard on this well-deserved recognition of his work, first across Wales and now covering the whole of the United Kingdom.

Jesus tells us that whenever we give food to the hungry, welcome a stranger, clothe the naked, or visit the sick or imprisoned, we act in kindness to Him. So Jesus tells us that by making acts of loving kindness we will be truly blessed. In God's kingdom, no one is hungry, naked, sick or alone.
