Here are two of his memorable reflections.

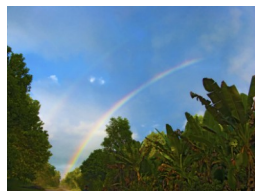

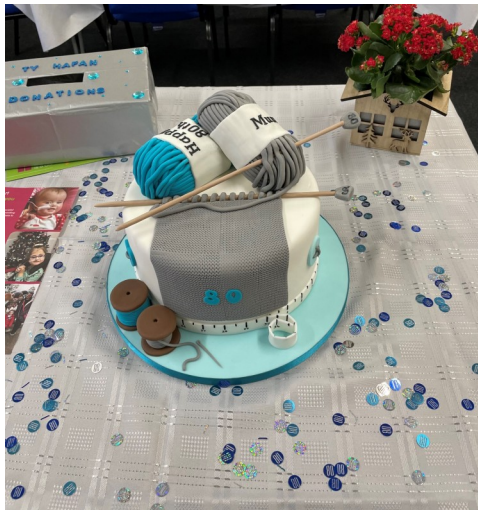
THANK YOU

The Whole People of God Called and Committed to His Service (A Consideration of Ministry)

At the Autumn Synod meeting last year we received a Proposal for the Provision of Ministry in Wales titled "The Whole People of God Called and Committed to His Service".

Synod representatives were asked to take this paper back to their local church for consideration and return to the Spring Synod this year with comments. The paper looks at the forecasts for full time ministry in Wales going forward to 2030 and considers what the Church's response could be. The paper asks a number of questions of Members, Elders and Ministers and offers suggestions on support that can be offered to help people develop in these roles.

In its introduction the report states,

"You are a human being, made in God's image, with the breath of God giving you this amazing life, and gifts and talents to live it to the full. You are reconciled to God through Jesus. You are a child of God. When people talk about 'the church' that is you. When you read 'the United Reformed Church', that is you. Whenever it says somewhere 'The National Synod of Wales' or just simply 'the Synod', that is you. If someone refers to your church by name, that is you.. When folk talk of the need for ministry in the church, they are asking about you, your God given gifts, your talents, the part which you play in the life of the church, in bringing that Jesus effect, that reconciliation with God to bear in your community."

The report asks a couple of questions to members of the Church namely: *“What gifts and talents do you have to offer in your service as a member of the church? What would help you to develop your faith and discipleship?”* and provides pointers to a number of initiatives to help us develop our walk of faith. It also asks questions of Elders and Ministers.

The report concludes that the Church should, *“embark on an intentional journey of developing our discipleship, our leadership and the way that we share our resources. It is a commitment to grow and be creative in our service, thinking of the church as the people whose faith and worship permeates every area of our lives, not just one hour on a Sunday morning led by ‘the Minister’ but every day, members, elders, CRCWs and Ministers of the Word and Sacraments, together walking the way, whole-life disciples of Jesus.”*

Please take time, if you can, to read and consider the full report and share your thoughts with me or one of the elders before the next Synod meeting at the beginning of March. I will distribute the report by email. Margaret Craig will be able to offer hard copies to anyone who does not have access to email.

Born 500, Died 560

Teilo was born in Penally, Pembrokeshire. He studied under Saints Dyfrig and Dubricius. He accompanied Saint David to Jerusalem (they were good friends) and was a friend and assistant to Saint Samson in Brittany for 7 years. He was quite successful as a preacher and founded and served as abbot-bishop of Llandaff Monastery in Dyfed. He also founded Llandilo Fawr and Penally Abbey. He was buried in Llandaff Cathedral.
