An Elder writes ...

On 27th March it will be Mothering Sunday and during the following week on 30th March my mum, Veronica will be 100, so I thought I'd share a little about this remarkable woman. She was born unexpectedly as the 2nd of twins - her sister being Monica. They were christened when they were 2 weeks old because mum was not supposed to survive very long. Her mother, who was 40 at the time with 3 children already said, 'I didn't want twins, and if I'd only had one I wanted a boy!' Despite that comment, mum regularly comments that she grew up in a loving family.

★ She says her father was 'more pious than thou' and ★
★ attended St German's church regularly and when they were ★
★ old enough he took the twins on Sunday. "Who's that dad?" ★
★ they would often ask as he chatted with someone on his ★
★ way there or back. Her mother stayed at home supporting ★
★ the family milk business.

After school, mum went to work for the Post Office as a telephonist and worked in 9 different telephone exchanges during the war. This included going to Swansea to help out after Swansea had been bombed. She also talks about the challenges of walking home to Splott in the dark (during the blackout) after a night shift in Llandaff exchange.

Mum met my father, John, at St German's and their relationship developed during the war years - despite my father spending quite some time away from home as he was in the RAF - and they married a couple of years after the war ended. This period was difficult for mum's family as her brother died at the end of the war in a Japanese prisoner of war camp. Mum gave up work as a telephonist when she married and never returned to work, focussing more on the care and nurture of her family. She says she had a cushy upbringing so after they married she had to learn to cook. When she told my father she wasn't sure how to make something his response was simply 'you can read the recipe can't you?' How times have changed! Dad went to work, mum looked after the house. They had 4 children (my 3 sisters and me) and we were brought up to go to church which helped each of us develop our own Christian faith.

Mum has always had a positive attitude to life. Carpe Diem
→ - Live for Today - is her motto. She says, "I wake up in the
→ morning and I thank God I am alive". Dad died when they
→ were 70, but mum took this in her stride and forged out a
→ new life on her own, quite happy to live independently up to
→ this day. Despite her movements becoming restricted, she
→ refuses to have a stair lift - "if I don't use my legs they'll stop
→ working", and continues to keep herself occupied by
→ crocheting lavender bags.

Mum has always had a strong Christian faith and we have always been able to discuss and share our faith as a family. This is down to mum's openness to share hers and allow it to develop as she has grown older. She regularly finds little reflections that she contributes to her own church magazine. She also expresses that faith in her care for others. She will regularly ring friends and family just to check how they are, it continues to surprise me how many people she is still in touch with.

I meet so many people who say, "Your mum is amazing" and I know what they mean. She has experienced much change in her life but still looks forward to what tomorrow brings. Hopefully, more of the same

THOMAS CARLYLE

Thomas was born in Scotland and was an influential historian and essayist. He was a cultural critic, lecturer and mathematician. His influences included Shakespeare and Muhamad.

His philosophy would unlikely be popular today as he espoused, 'the rule of all life was that life was ruled by inequality;' he believed that ruling should be left to the most competent members of society, most would and should, he felt, come from the aristocracy.

LENT

So where does **Lent** come from, and how do we "do" Lent?

The Lenten season developed as part of the historical Christian calendar and is typically celebrated by Catholics, Orthodox Christians, and some mainline Protestant churches that follow a liturgical calendar. Although its format has varied throughout the centuries and throughout different cultures, the basic concept remains the same:

-to open our hearts to God's refining grace through prayer, confession, fasting, and almsgiving as we anticipate Holy Week.

Lent traditionally lasts forty days, modelled after Christ's forty-day fast in the desert, and ends on Good Friday. In the Western Church, Lent officially begins with a reminder of our mortality.

She will also be performing in the 150th Anniversary, Patron's Concert, of Dunvant Male Choir in Swansea. Sir Bryn Terfel is also a guest artist. Angharad is delighted as this will be her first concert in 2022. We look forward to the time when Angharad, David and Ryan will once more be able to perform at VAN-guard.
