An Elder writes ...

In the fourteenth century there was not a single copy of the Bible in English! It was only available in Latin, the language of the clergy, and those were chained to the podiums of the cathedrals. Then a prominent professor of divinity at Oxford University said.

'This is not right. People should be able to read the Bible in their own language.'

Church leaders branded him a heretic. Like Noah, who pounded the nails into the ark while people ridiculed and scorned him, John Wycliffe began translating the scriptures as a flood of persecution emerged around him.

When he completed his translation of the Scriptures, he wrote this :

'This Bible is translated and shall make possible a government of the people, by the people and for the people.'

Thirty years after Wycliffe died he was again proclaimed a heretic, consequently, his body was exhumed, his ashes cast into a river. A contemporary historian describes the scene like this:

'This book has conveyed his ashes into the river Avon, Avon into the Seven, Seven into the narrow seas, then into the ocean. And thus ashes...are the emblem of his doctrine...now... dispersed the world over.'

'All men are like grass, and all their glory is like the flowers of the field;

The grass withers and the flowers fall, But the word of the Lord stands forever. And this is the word that was preached to you.' (1Peter1:24-25)

Thanks to John Wycliffe, God's word stands forever and can be read forever by all.





Our prayers are with John and their family and friends.


