

Notes from Spring Synod 2024

The Spring Synod meeting was held online at the beginning of March. It was very much an information sharing meeting rather than a decision making meeting. There were presentations on Lay ministry, training opportunities including Stepwise, hearing the voice of young children, the and the General Elections, together with a reminder of the work of the Church in Rural Communities and heard of how a number of the Churches in the Synod are becoming more environmentally aware, through registering for Eco church, like Van Road, running Eco based events such as coffee mornings etc.

When considering our engagement with the forth coming General election, we were reminded of a number of General Assembly resolutions including:

When reflecting on poverty and inequality in the UK, it not only expressed concern in the light of the gospel call to challenge poverty and structures that cause marginalisation but challenges political leaders to commit to work to eradicate structural poverty and to challenge the stigmatisation and discrimination shown to those in poverty. Churches were also encouraged to raise these issues with their prospective MPs

Churches and members were encouraged to write to their MPs to express opposition to the illegal migration bill and encourage them to explore alternative legal routes for those seeking asylum. Assembly believes that those fleeing war or persecution should be treated fairly and compassionately irrespective of the situation which has brought them to our country, and again encourages Churches and members to write to their MPs to support this call.

When engaging with the General Election, there were some key point: Don't ignore it!; Call for action on poverty; Raise issues that matter to you; Spread the word about voting. On voting we were reminded that this will be the first time we will need to use voter id and many people (often from disadvantaged backgrounds) may not be aware or have the necessary form of id that it required, so we were encouraged to spread the word for the need for id and offer support for those that may need it so that as many can be engaged in the elections as possible.

We were also pointed to a number of useful websites that can help inform us further.
