A Message from our Pastorate Minister, Rev. Clare Nutbrown-Hughes

Annwyl ffrindiau,

Dear friends,

Remember, remember the fifth of November! So much of November is about remembering. As well as celebrating the demise of Guy Fawkes across our communities we also honour the sacrifice of those who gave their lives in times of war. In the Church calendar, the Saints are recalled on All Saints' Day followed by a time of remembering those who have died on All Souls' Day. November connects us with what has gone before.

The Bible is big on remembering. Much of its first five books are about God pledging to remember the people of Israel and the covenant(s) made with them which the emergent nation is then urged to remember in turn.

Most of the Hebrew Bible, the Old Testament, is however, about what happens when God's people forget. Against the backdrop of all this forgetting the psalmists plead, 'Remember not the sins of my youth' (Ps 25:7) and 'Remember me , O Lord, when you show favour to your people' (Ps 106:4). It seems the habit of wanting the remembering to go our way is an ancient one.

But there's another kind of remembering in the Bible. It is one that urges us not to simply interpret the past in a manner that suits our purposes, but to look back with fresh eyes to glean new understanding. When the disciples fail to grasp what is unfolding before them regarding either the

new realm that Jesus is ushering in, or the hostility of the religious and political authorities, Jesus asks them despairingly, 'Do you not remember?' (Mk 8:18). Jesus wants them to reflect anew on all he has said and done and see what is really happening instead of just what they want to see.

On Easter morning in Luke's Gospel the women disciples arriving at the tomb are urged by two angels to *remember* what Jesus had told them (Lk 24:6), to look back with new eyes to gain a fresh perspective on what is taking place. A perspective which will help them now in their grief and their new circumstances.

Perhaps this is a reminder this month to not allow our remembering to simply shore up our existing understandings, but for it to open up new insights which help us in our lives now. As our political and cultural landscape shifts so rapidly, what new lessons from both Jesus' life and history could be just below the surface if we might only remember?

May there be both comfort and challenge in our remembering,



Vanguard News

During October, the Vanguard Centre has hosted a number of concerts that have all been well received. The month started with a Gala concert from the Melody Makers. They were supported by the Jukebox Ukulele who were thoroughly entertaining with their humorous renditions of various 1960's hits. The Melody Makers sang songs from various shows and they introduced two of their children - one giving a duet with his mum and the other playing a solo violin piece.

The Affinity Choir gave an excellent performance of the both Welsh and English songs. They were joined by 2 to choirs from over the border to perform both the individually and together. It was great to see the stage to full of singers.

The Classical Caerphilly series of free lunchtime concerts also started in October. This was an opportunity for three post-graduate singers from the Royal College of Music and Drama (Rhys Archer, Kirsty McRobbie and Emma Evans) to perform in a setting other than 'as part of our assessment in college'. The audience enjoyed it and the singers seemed to too. These concerts will continue monthly on a Thursday lunchtime. The next one on 13th November will give 3 undergraduates the opportunity to perform at Vanguard.

We also have occasional visits of Only Men Aloud and Paul Chegwidden from Puresonics who uses the Worship Space to record singers so they can present their work for auditions. A new contact is Sarah Conway from Blossom Brilliance who is using one of the rooms as a space for Primary pupil tuition. She started sessions in September on a Tuesday after school and will soon have additional sessions on a Monday.

It was with some sadness that we recently read of Nigel Jones' decision to end his role as Musical director of Wind and Strings. Nigel has been a great supporter of Vanguard, having originally established the Caerphilly Community Chorus in 2009. He was instrumental in acquiring the baby grand piano for the Chorus and has continued to support Vanguard through regular concerts, initially with the Chorus and subsequently with the Wind and Strings. He will be sorely missed.

Since the beginning of the year Vanguard has been grateful to Chris Harling and Jan Holdsworth for helping out at concerts. Going forward, a small group consisting of David Forte, Margaret Baldwin, Phyllis Frayling, John Wade and Rob Moverley have begun to meet to help organise the future of Vanguard events.
